IMPORTANT INFORMATION AND FOOTNOTES

All courses on IGETC must be completed with a grade of “C” or better. Grades of “C-” are not acceptable. Each course acceptable for IGETC must have a minimum of 3 semester or 4 quarter unit value. Students wishing to use a course to meet an IGETC requirement must be sure that the course is on the IGETC list during the academic year when it is taken.

- UC credit may be limited. (1) No credit given for introductory courses if taken after a more advanced college course, (2) credit may be limited for courses with overlapping content, (3) duplicate credit will not be awarded for both the Honors and regular version of a course.
- Courses taken at a regionally accredited colleges or universities that are not part of the California Community College system can meet general education requirements on the IGETC/Plan C. Approval of IGETC general education placement is done by the Articulation Officer via the “Pass Along” review process.
- Certification is not a UC admissions requirement.

- COUN 160, COUN 161, COUN 200, COUN 206 and COUN 210 combined: maximum credit, 3 units
- ESCI 119 and ESCI 120 combined: maximum credit, 1 course
- ECON 100, ECON 101 and ECON 102 combined: maximum credit, 2 courses
- ENGL 101 and ESL 101 combined: maximum credit, 1 course
- ENGL 101E: maximum credit, 4 units
- SPAN 201 and SPAN 210 combined: maximum credit, 1 course
- Any or all of these PE Activity courses combined: maximum credit, 4 units
- Refer to UCTCA for PE Theory course unit limitations
- MATH 165, MATH 165H and PSY 103 combined: maximum credit, 1 course
- MATH 170 and MATH 175 combined: maximum credit, 5 semester/7.5 quarter units
- MATH 180 and MATH 190 combined: maximum credit, 1 course
- No credit for PHYS 110 if taken after PHYS 111 or PHYS 201
- PHYS 111, PHYS 111C, PHYS 112 and PHYS 201, PHYS 202, PHYS 203 combined: maximum credit, 1 series
- PHYS 111C must have a prerequisite or co-requisite of PHYS 111 to be transferable
- PSY 103, MATH 165 and MATH 165H combined: maximum credit, 1 course
